



### The Old Depot, Dassel, MN

When the Burlington Northern Railroad decided to eliminate most of it's small town depots, the one in Cokato Minnesota was put up for sale. Howard Page, a member of the Rotary Club of Cokato-Dassel bought the depot for a nominal amount, cut it in half and moved it six miles to Dassel where it now rests on a new foundation. Needless to say, Page was fined at Rotary for absconding with a local treasure.

Initially used for community melodrama, birthday parties and Christmas craft sales the heritage of the rails soon demanded a decor suitable to such a building. That started with lanterns, a telegraph key and a bench in the waiting room. That hint of atmosphere was enough to start a never ending search of railroad artifacts that now fills the main floor and basement of the 33' x 100' structure.

Railroad items from around the world are now on display. Conductor's hats from Austria, Italy, Taiwan, Australia, China and many United States railroads fill one showcase. Signs, bells, whistles, signals, tools, uniforms, china, tickets, passes, spittoons, oil cans, lanterns and baggage carts let the visitors see how many items are used in a railroad operation.

School children from surrounding schools frequently tour the museum. A model train layout fascinates the young and the young at heart. The wide array of toy trains shows that since the beginnings of railroading in the 1800's trains have been a favorite plaything of kids of all ages.

The picture gallery depicts the progress of locomotives from primitive steamers to the "Bullet" trains of Japan.

Outside the depot there's a

restored wooden caboose that is open to show the public the lives of a train crew. An old time caboose has trucks with hardwood components that date back to the 1880's.

A quarter scale locomotive, tender and caboose in the yard give kids a chance to be an engineer for their parent's camera.

This is a museum that was a real Great Northern depot. It was around long before Burlington and Great Northern merged, and will be around a bit longer thanks to Howard.

The Old Depot is open daily from Memorial Day through October 1st. Dassel is 50 miles west of Minneapolis.



### MEMBERSHIP DUES


Dues are \$6.00 US for U.S.A. residents, \$6.75 US for residents of Canada and Mexico and \$9.00 US for all others.

Non U.S.A. residents can pay by VISA or MASTERCARD.


